



Just in time to prep for the holidays, we are pleased to invite you to hear from local cook, author and storyteller, **Jonathan Bardzik**. Self-trained with more than 20 years in his home kitchen, Jonathan is inspired by the seasonal, local ingredients he grew up with and finds today at the farm market. Jonathan's culinary passion is to explore those farm and garden-fresh flavors, create food for friends and family, and share his adventures to help others find joy in their own home kitchens. Jonathan's professional culinary career began in 2011 when he started offering weekly cooking demonstrations at DC's historic Eastern Market. Since then, Jonathan has

made more than 150 live appearances at Eastern Market and other local venues, including the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the National Geographic Museum and has developed more than 600 recipes. Nov. 18th @ 11:15am Keith Fleeman, former head of Kensington Park Library, will discuss *Our Souls at Night* by Ken Haruf. The book is set in the



same fictional Colorado town as his National Book Award nominated *Plainsong*, a town with its fair share of gossips. Addie, a window, and Louis, a widower, embark on an unlikely friendship, an antidote to the loneliness they most exquisitely feel at night. Inspired, in part, by Haruf's own marriage and the intimate, late-night conversations he and his wife relished, this book proves you are never too old to re-invent yourself.

Dec. 16th @ **11:15am** Anneli Levy, retired librarian, will discuss a memoir by Rox Chast, *Can't We Talk About Something More Pleasant*. In this National Book Award finalist, Roz Chast brings her signature wit to the topic of aging parents. Anneli likes looking at this book from the perspective of the parents and as a way to help us understand what our children think and feel. Told through four-color cartoons, family photos, and documents, this is a narrative as rife with laughs as it is with tears.



Jellyfish Have Eyes by Joram Piatigorsky. Fiction. Piatigorsky's debut novel is a suspenseful thriller mixing the biological sciences – research into the surprisingly fascinating world of jellyfish eyes – and politics. The story provides a dive into the large government research world and the impacts of political winds and demands for immediate 'practical value' for taxpayer support – value in terms of cures, treatments, drugs – and the outcomes of impoverishing basic research which is critical for such cures. The story is told through the eyes of protagonist, Dr. Ricardo Sztein, a biological scientist perhaps reminiscent of the author himself, who battles the politicians and bureaucrats in his energetic search for scientific truth, but facing enormous odds comes to a sad end. It is a rollicking tale nevertheless, and deserves a wide audience.






The Camel Club (series) by David Baldacci. Fiction. The series consists of The Camel Club, The Collectors, Stone Cold, Divine Justice, and Hell's Corner.

The first book is not as exciting as the rest of the series but I do recommend that they are read in order. The unusual crew of misfits that band together to deal with government intrigue, abuse, murder and mayhem are effective and show that their patriotism is not blindly tied to agency, individual or cause. They would make a great

Us: A Novel by David Nicholls. Fiction. The story focuses on soon to be empty nesters, Connie and Douglas, married for over 20 years with a son getting ready to leave for university (set in the UK). Just before the family is to depart on their last trip as a unit – a Grand Tour of Europe - Connie tells Douglas she wants a divorce. Douglas uses the trip to reclaim his family. At times, this book reads like a comic caper, at times it is a loving reflection of a marriage, at times it features the maddening disagreements couples have and the impacts raising children can have on a marriage. The descriptions from the various places in Europe are also a treat. A good read.

Anyone can set up a free library. Folks use homemade shelving units, repurposed phone booths, crafty kiosks, and all sorts of other book-holding paraphernalia to house these free-rein book exchanges. See <u>this gallery of Google images</u> for clever examples. Some are sophisticated and others are simple; all serve to promote a love of books.

There is a well-organized hub to this grassroots initiative that welcomes newbies everyday. The 'official' Little Free Libraries network aims...

The Rules:

- 1. Create your own Little Free Library (official Registration with LFL.org is optional)
- 2. Include a sign or similar that features the KP FOL. Offer access to KP FOL membership information.
 - Option: print on heavy paper the attached bookmarks to share
 - Option: print and share the attached membership application http://bit.ly/IM7rwV9
- 3. Submit your entry to kensingtonpark@folmc.org by April 18, 2016.
- 4. Entries must include:
 - a. Up to 3 photos of your LFL. The KP FOL promotional material must be visible in at least 1 photo.
 - b. Address/location of your LFL
 - c. Up to 10 sentences about how your LFL was made.

 Optional: Names & ages of anyone who helped build your LFL.
 - d. Up to 5 sentences to explain OR a chart to show how your LFL is expected to be used or has been used to date.
 - e. A statement that the submission is being made by an adult (18+)
- 5. The KP FOL Board will select the Grand Prize Winner by reviewing each entry for:
 - Compliance to all rules
 - Overall design/appeals including how KP FOL is featured
 - Practical function/ease of use for visitors
 - Apparent durability of the LFL structure
 - Use/traffic potential (based on location choice and/or any submitted use 'data')
